IT'S A DRAW

Gaining 97 for her Grade 8 cello and clarinet exams earned Auckland student Sophie Hamer two Trinity College London Exhibition Awards. Sibling teachers Sarah and Scott McDowall describe her as the model student.

'As music teachers we cherish all of our students and take great satisfaction in watching them learn and succeed, but of course there will be the occasional student who stands out. Sophie is one of these and is without question one of the very best pupils I have ever taught.

'The fact that she achieved such a fantastic result in Grade 8 after just five years tuition (consisting of a single 20 minute itinerant lesson at school each week) speaks volumes of her dedication and character...When I received Sophie's result of 97% I phoned my sister to share the good news (and maybe to brag a tiny bit), only to be met with the news that she had scored the same in cello!' – Scott McDowall

'She is an absolute inspiration to the younger students here at the studio. She has been tutoring and mentoring some of the juniors, and has learnt very quickly how to relate to them and coach them effectively. She is always polite, helpful, kind and shows an enormous amount of intuition...I can see a wonderful future ahead of her in whatever she chooses to do.' – Sarah McDowall.

Sophie's exams were approximately an hour apart, and followed hot on the heels of her 2017 NCEA Level 3 exams. Coming from a musical family instilled discipline. 'My mum plays the piano and the violin and she studied music as part of her degree at university. We have lots of fun playing music together at home. My grandpa used to help me practise when I was younger. He helped me to develop good practising habits, encouraging me to repeat passages until I got it right no matter how many times or how long it took.'

Sophie is now studying cello performance with Heleen du Plessis at the University of Otago and continues to play the clarinet in a symphonic band. \blacklozenge

COMPOSITION AND PERFORMANCE: A WINNING COMBINATION



In 2018 Fergus Byett, Year 13 student and Head Boy at Tauhara College in Taupo, won the Big Sing's annual NZCF/SOUNZ Choral Composition Competition for the second time, with his piece Karanga Ākau for SATB choir and piano. Based on the Māori legend of Pania and the Reef, the piece 'is a setting of an original poem, which imagines the call of the reef to Pania which compels her to return to the ocean. As well as being a call to Pania, this piece is a call to listeners to remember their families and their home, even when they themselves have moved on.' Fergus has regularly entered practical and written exams since 2012, and under the guidance of his teacher, Lenice Frisken, has consistently gained Distinction and Merit results. 2018 was a big year for Fergus: along with his Big Sing success, he passed his ATCL Recital piano exam with a mark of 82 and won the IRMTNZ Rotorua-Taupo Senior Scholarship Competition. NEWZATS CONFERENCE 2018

Singing teachers and students found plenty of inspiration at last year's NEWZATS Conference, as Annemarie Gasparini explains.

After finally getting around to joining NEWZATS, it was a privilege to attend their bi-annual conference in my home town: a great opportunity to catch up with the singing teachers in my area, reconnect with others from around the country and make some new friends too.

NEWZATS secured American pedagogue David Jones as the keynote speaker. Considered a world expert in teaching the techniques of the Old Swedish-Italian and Italian Singing Schools, his knowledge of using these techniques for treating voice disorders has seen him training some of the most successful international singers at the world's leading opera houses including the Metropolitan Opera and the Royal Opera House in Covent Garden.

David presented a mixture of lectures and masterclasses. He was extremely generous with his time, and watching singers transform under such expert tutelage was a rare treat.

Delegates were also lucky to gain some wisdom in contemporary singing from Nick Hollamby. Nick is Lecturer in Singing and Music at the National Academy of Singing and Dramatic Art in Christchurch. He supplied us with titbits on contemporary singing trends, tips for teaching, and explained the expectations and specific stylistic demands of contemporary style.

Lunchtime presentations by NEWZATS members made for an information-packed conference with topics covering Māori music in the studio and NCEA, papers on the male adolescent voice, and the choral soprano in the studio among others.

In addition to the highlight of seeing David Jones in action, conference attendees were treated to a very special night of lovely food at Auckland's prestigious Northern Club, and wonderful entertainment from Nick Hollamby and NEWZATS member Jane Keller.

NELSON CENTRE OF MUSICAL ARTS (NCMA)

When the Nelson Centre of Musical Arts (formerly Nelson School of Music) closed for earthquake strengthening and redevelopment in 2013, many in Nelson's musical community found themselves without a home for concerts, rehearsals, lessons, exams and other performing arts activities. Churches, schools and private studios provided temporary shelter, and although not ideal, the inconvenience was made palatable by the knowledge that a fabulous new multipurpose facility was being built, with the historic auditorium remaining as part of the complex.

The refurbished NCMA features state-ofthe-art performance, rehearsal and studio spaces, and has the flexibility to attract local and international events.

Since the Centre re-opened in April 2018 Communications Manager Robyn Sheves, says that 'student numbers have exceeded expectations and the NCMA team are thrilled that so many people of all ages are learning and performing in such an inspiring environment.'

NCMA's education programme features a wide range of options, from preschool classes to individual lessons, and orchestral, choral and chamber groups. International events include the recent NCMA Guitar Festival and the Adam Chamber Music Festival. Visit **ncma.nz** for details ◆

2018 NZCT CHAMBER MUSIC CONTEST

Music teachers searching for a way to motivate and engage rebellious teen students might find the answer in chamber music: throw in a pinch of healthy competition and they're hooked!

More than 400 secondary school ensembles in 15 districts nationwide took part in the 2018 NZCT Chamber Music Contest. Spirits were as high as the standards, and the wide range of repertoire reflected the diversity of instruments.

Those that deservedly made it to the national finals in Christchurch won the hearts of the audience. Overall winners, Te Ahi Kaa from Northland, gave a riveting performance of the first movement of Schubert's String Quartet No. 14, *Death and the Maiden*. All Te Ahi Kaa's members have affiliations to the iwi of Ngāpuhi and Waikato, and first violinist Maia-Dean Martin said she hoped the win would 'Encourage more Māori to take it seriously and get hard out into it.'

Benjamin Sneyd-Utting deserves special mention as second-time winner of the Senior Composition Award for his String Quartet No. 1. Benjamin has a history of flying through Trinity exams and in 2017 he gained ATCL Cello with a Distinction. One might say music is in his blood: father Craig Utting is a composer and mother Dr Elizabeth Sneyd received the inaugural Music Teacher of the Year Tui at the Vodafone NZ Music Awards 2018!

Planning for this year's festival is well underway, with details regularly updated on SGCNZ's website **sgcnz.org.nz** and the University of Otago's **shakespeare.otago**. **ac.nz**. The National SGCNZ UOSWSF will take place, as usual, over Queen's Birthday weekend, from Thursday 30 May - Monday 3 June.

The assessor provided by Trinity College London for the 2018 National Festival, Alison Rose, wrote: 'I was overwhelmed and enchanted by the skill, passion, energy and commitment of the students brought together from all over New Zealand by a shared love of Shakespeare at the extraordinary SGCNZ University of Otago Sheilah Winn Shakespeare Festival.' Alison also took two valuable workshops, *Delivering the Text*.

The inclusion of Year 7 and 8 students is proving very popular. By the time they get to 15 when they become eligible for selection for the week-long intensive SGCNZ National Shakespeare Schools Production (SGCNZ NSSP), many have been relishing Shakespeare for at least 5 years!

Seeing them all perform so passionately reminded me of my own SGCNZ experience, wringing all the drama, comedy and pathos out of those Shakespeare extracts.

NEW MUSIC DIPLOMAS

The new Music Performance Diplomas syllabus sees the addition of over 1,200 new pieces to our repertoire across all subjects! This, plus the option to select own-choice pieces gives candidates the opportunity to present programmes that reflect their own unique musical interests and strengths. The emphasis of these qualifications is on performance, with 96% of marks awarded for the recital section. Candidates also provide a short written programme, just as they would when putting together a professional recital. However, detailed programme notes are no longer required for ATCL and LTCL diplomas.

Other changes include:

- Repertoire lists can now be found online, allowing them to be updated more frequently
- Assessment of stagecraft has been moved to the recital section
- Requirements for teaching diplomas are now available separately

Online support continues to grow: you can find a range of support resources at **trinitycollege.com/diploma-resources**, which include guidance on exam structure

and preparation, support on building a programme and advice and inspiration from our professional diploma alumni.


Please note that there will be no overlap between syllabuses. The current syllabus (2009-2018) has been extended until the end of July 2019. Candidates sitting exams from 1 August 2019 will be required to use the new 'from 2019' syllabus. ◆

NEW MUSIC GRADES

The Brass Syllabus 2019-2022 and Electronic Keyboard Syllabus 2019-2022 are now available for download or in hard copy, with key changes listed on the inside front cover. These syllabuses are valid from 1 January 2019. The 2015-2018 syllabuses will remain valid until 31 December 2019, giving a one year overlap. During this time candidates may present pieces and technical work from the 2015-2018 or 2019-2022 syllabus but not both. Candidates should indicate which syllabus they are presenting on the appointment form handed to the examiner at the start of the exam. ◆ Trinity offers a fabulous range of music resources, from videos and audio, handouts and booklets and much more in between at trinitycollege.com/music-resources

Communication Skills exams from 2019:

- Develop a range of transferable communication skills, including problemsolving, creativity, team-working and organisational skills, that will have a positive impact in both education and the workplace
- Feature practical tasks that reflect real-world situations such as preparing and presenting CVs for interview, stories for broadcast, and debates on current issues
- Now include an Initial grade for groups, giving beginner candidates a goal and supporting preparation for Grade 1 onwards
- Are explained clearly in new-format specifications for teachers and candidates
- Are accompanied by online digital resources that provide advice and support on exam structure and preparation, and interviews with examiners, teachers and past candidates – see trinitycollege.com/ communication-skills


There is a full year overlap for 2019 during which candidates can enter either using the old OR the new specifications, the choice to be indicated on the appointment form. The Professional Certificate in Communication Skills is being withdrawn:

- Skills that were being developed with this exam are now incorporated into the Advanced level graded exams and so a separate exam is not required
- Candidates can continue to enter for this exam during the overlap period. ◆
