This exam paper has three tasks. You must complete all tasks.

Task 1 - Reading into writing task - text synthesis

Read the information below and then, in your own words, write an article for a local newspaper:

- i) assessing the value of the development of a new forest in your area (using Woodland Forest as a model)
- ii) analysing what approach the organisation that manages this project should take to ensure the new forest's success **and**
- iii) discussing how the people in your area might react to such a project.

(Write about 350 words)

Use your own words as far as possible. No marks for answers copied from the reading text. You must make reference to both the text and the graphic information in your answer.

Woodland Forest – real growth!

Over the past 25 years, an area that was once full of abandoned industrial buildings has been transformed into the stunningly beautiful Woodland Forest.

We all know that trees help clean up the environment, but the development of Woodland Forest has had many other positive spin-offs. Wildlife's certainly thriving, with animals and birds coming back to the area.

Children adore playing there, adults are eager to walk there, tourists now flock to the area – what's not to like? Well, some people whinge about the 'hordes' of tourists 'blocking the roads' with their cars. I can't say I noticed.

And, at first, there were some raised voices. To quote one: 'Planting all those trees is nonsense! Give us houses, not a forest!' Another moaned 'Work is the key, and a forest won't give us jobs.' But the Woodland Forest Company persisted. Ironically, the forest has led to more house-building as people move to the area, and to more jobs. There is an unexpected number of jobs in forested areas: from manufacturing paper products using sustainable sources to re-planting trees.

Not to mention tourism, which is doing very well indeed. The economy of the area is booming! And the cherry on the cake? Local people are very much happier.

But of course, the Woodland Forest Company didn't just plant the trees anywhere. This wouldn't have worked nearly so well as planned planting. They planted trees both on open land and around areas of housing. The great thing is that it's so easy for people to use the forest. The company also produced a tourism marketing plan. This looked at who might visit the forest, what kind of activities they'd like and where they'd prefer to stay. The company works closely with schools too – so important!

With such amazing results, the project has proved itself, despite some opposition. May it inspire others to develop forest areas!

The organisations that are willing to invest and develop such project shouldn't worry whether this can succeed or not. It is evident the local authorities will help with it as well as the local people because what we want for our town is a mix of development, economy – growth and safety.

Nevertheless, we must take into account that there might be some people who won't be thrilled with the whole idea. I have lived my entire life in this community and I know people who are always negative. The more you explain it to them, the more the are neglected. We shouldn't worry about them. Rationale Task 1 – Reading into writing task – text synthesis

TASK FULFILMENT

Grade: C

Overall achievement of communicative aim

The candidate makes use of all source materials and provides a good summary of the data from the tables and graphics. However, more information from the first text could have been used in order to fully analyse, rather than merely mention, the approach the organisation that manages the project should take to ensure success. Adequate reference to the local area is made throughout.

*Tip: Candidates must analyse the task in detail and ensure that all requirements of the task are satisfied. Failure to do so will have a detrimental effect on the grade awarded.

Text organisation

The task is well organised with appropriate paragraphs and there is an attempt at using cohesive devices. However, these are not always used effectively and some ideas do not always develop logically. For example, 'How may those companies or organisation feel attracted to this plan?' is an appropriate opener for a paragraph, but what follows does not offer any expansion.

Appropriacy of format, style and register

The task asks for an article, and there is a title as well as occasional questions to draw the reader in. Overall, the appropriate format, style and register are realised.

Effect on the reader

The desired effect on the reader is mostly achieved.

ACCURACY AND RANGE

Grade: D

Accuracy and range of the grammatical, functional and lexical items of the level

The language used is generally accurate and at times very effective, eg 'This can give a clearer idea...', 'We must take into account that there may be some people who won't be thrilled...', but overall it lacks the complexity expected of ISE IV.

Some errors do occur, eg 'other fun activities people enjoy doing them with family are...', 'What was mentioned lines above', 'Look forward to living this project', but do not impede understanding.

*Tip: Candidates must show a comprehensive mastery of a very wide range of language to formulate thoughts precisely and use differing linguistic forms to reformulate ideas to convey finer shades of meaning.

Spelling and punctuation

There are occasional spelling errors, eg 'the goverment', 'scenary' and occasional misuse of punctuation marks '...who want what was mentioned lines above; prosperity.'

Rationale Task 2 – Reading into writing task – text transformation

TASK FULFILMENT

Grade: B

Overall achievement of communicative aim

There is good execution of the task, both in terms of content and format, which requires an online forum with at least two contributors. The candidate makes good use of the source material, everything included is relevant and the main points are covered by both contributors in a natural way.

Text organisation

There is an effective logical structure which helps the reader recognise the main points. Even though some points may be referred to by both contributors (therefore causing repetition), they are expressed differently. Both contributions use paragraphs and some cohesive devices. However, the use of 'the only negative thing...' at the start of the fourth paragraph may cause the reader confusion as the previous sentence already expresses a negative aspect.

Appropriacy of format, style and register

The format, style and register are appropriate to the task. Phrases such as 'Completely agree with you!', 'Tell me about it!' not only act as clear cohesive devices and show effective turn-taking, but they also add to the effective execution of an informal blog and are very natural in the exchange.

Effect on the reader

The effect on the reader is positive.

ACCURACY AND RANGE

Grade: C

Accuracy and range of the grammatical, functional and lexical items of the level

There is satisfactory coverage of grammatical, lexical and functional language items used. The language used is accurate but range is somewhat restricted and sometimes lacks the complexity required at this level. Contractions, some of them incorrect (eg 'I'd doubts', 'there're'), are overused. However, any errors do not impede understanding.

*Tip: Candidates must show a comprehensive mastery of a very wide range of language to formulate thoughts precisely and use differing linguistic forms to reformulate ideas to convey finer shades of meaning.

Spelling and punctuation

Spelling and punctuation are generally good.

Task 3 – Critical and analytical writing task

'It is the mark of an educated mind to be able to give consideration to a thought without accepting it.' Aristotle, philosopher (384-322 BC)

Write an essay:

- i) discussing the meaning of the statement
- ii) analysing its importance in the educational sphere and
- iii) supporting your views with relevant examples.

(Write about 250 words)

As the Greek philosophor Aristotle states, it is highly appreciable to take into consideration a thought which may be fore from our way of thinking and give it an opportunity of being processed even though you do not agree with it. It may not be easy and it implies an open-mindedness often found in educated people.

This attitude is of great importance, especially nowadays, with globalisation and the moving of people from one continent to another. They bring different cultures with them, different customs and attitudes and it is fundamental for a peaceful cohabitation to leave to give them consideration, which means we are not forced to accept them.

In the educational sphere it is of vital importance. If we analyse the composition of present day classes, in any order of education, we may not be surprised to realize that in each there are at least three of four different ethnic groups. As a consequence, teachers and educators have the task to teach pupils and students to take different customs and believes into serious consideration and try to respect them.

Nonetheless, this does not mean we are to accept infibulation the lack of consideration and respect given to women by certain cultures or violence of any kind although they might be a routine in someone's life.

In conclusion, our attitude should be that of another famous philopher, the French Voltaire which stated "I am neither religious nor do I believe in God, but I would give my life to enable you to be free to be a religious person!"

Rationale Task 3 – Critical and analytical writing task

TASK FULFILMENT

Grade: C

Overall achievement of communicative aim

All three sub-tasks are addressed. The candidate shows understanding of the quotation and uses relevant examples to illustrate its importance in the educational field. However, the response refers to accepting cultural differences rather than giving 'consideration to a thought', as per the statement, and therefore the reader would not be fully informed.

Text organisation

The response is well-organised into appropriate paragraphs, simple cohesive devices are used, eg 'as a consequence', 'nonetheless', and there is a logical development of ideas. However, a greater variety of more sophisticated connectors and cohesive devices at this level would have enhanced the writing.

Appropriacy of format, style and register

Appropriate format, style and register are generally used.

Effect on the reader

Desired effect on the reader is mostly achieved. The text satisfactorily informs and engages the reader.

ACCURACY AND RANGE

Grade: C

Accuracy and range of the grammatical, functional and lexical items of the level

There is a satisfactory range of the language items of the level, although there is occasional awkwardness, eg 'an opportunity of being processed'. Minor errors, eg 'an open-mindedness often find in', 'Voltaire which stated', 'customs and believes', do not impede understanding.

Spelling and punctuation

Spelling and punctuation are generally satisfactory.
