

Making copies of your music for uploading

What do I need to upload when I submit my exam?

In order to fairly assess a candidate's performance in a music exam, the examiner needs to have copies of all the pieces (the scores) that are being performed.

For most exams you will not need to upload any score yourself. If the item/piece is found in the **Piece published by Trinity (on syllabus)** dropdown list, the examiner will have their own copy of the music.

This is the case for most graded exams in Piano, Guitar, Violin, Electronic Keyboard, Drum Kit and Rock and Pop, and some exams in Recorder, Flute, Clarinet, Singing and Trumpet.

Examiners also have the music for all Classical & Jazz Technical Work, such as copies of orchestral extracts, studies, unaccompanied folk songs and Vaccai exercises.

When do I need to upload the score(s)?

If the item/piece is found in the **Piece not published by Trinity (on syllabus)** dropdown list, then a scan of the score must be uploaded as the examiner will not have their own copy of the music. Note that for accompanied exams such as Violin or Saxophone, only the instrumental score is required, not the piano part. All music played as part of a Diploma exam should be uploaded with the exception of pieces performed from the Trinity Diploma Recital Anthology, where only the first page is required. Please note that if you are playing an alternative edition of a piece available in the Anthology, a full copy will still need to be provided.

The procedure is the same if the piece performed is a candidate's own composition. In this case, the **Composer and Title** box should be completed with candidate name and piece title, eg *Lydia Tar: Serenade*. The music must then be uploaded so that the examiner can reference it when marking the exam.

How many documents can I upload?

Each score to be uploaded should be a separate file (or files). Ideally just one document should be uploaded for each piece, containing the whole piece/score. If the piece is only one or two pages in length, then a simple photograph can be uploaded. For longer pieces, a multi-page document or pdf file should be submitted. The file should be named with the composer/artist followed by the title (eg *Bizet: Chanson du Toréador or The Clash: Janey Jones*).

If it is not possible to create such a document, up to five individual photos per item can be uploaded, each named with sequential numbers (eg *Capuzzi: Andante1, Capuzzi: Andante2, Capuzzi: Andante3*). The acceptable file types are listed underneath the upload box.
