Spot the Phrasal Verb

Grade: GESE Grade 6 (CEFR B1.2)

Time: 50-60 minutes

Aims:

- To encourage oral fluency and spontaneity
- ▶ To practise lexis specific to the conversation areas of GESE Grade 6
- To recognise & use common phrasal verbs at B1 level
- ▶ To help familiarize with common phrasal verbs and their meaning while at the same time gaining more confidence in using them

Sub-skill focus:

Fluency, turn taking, responding and initiating, range of words and functions

Exam task focus:

▶ GESE Grade 6 – conversation area

Resources:

Phrasal verb cards

Procedure

Lead-in - Phrasal verb race

- 1. Teacher announces to students that they are going to take part in a phrasal verb race.
- 2. Teacher puts students into groups of 6 and assigns each group a subject area: health and fitness, travel, etc.
- 3. Students now have 2 mins max to brainstorm as many phrasal verbs as they know on that topic.
- 4. After 2 minutes, the teacher stops the activity and feeds-back students ideas in class.

Stage 1 - Match the phrasal verb to the meaning

- 1. The teacher now gives each group a set of phrasal verb cards face down.
- 2. Teacher says ready, steady, go and students have 4 minutes to match each phrasal verb with its meaning.
- 3. The first group to shout 'finished' gets the teachers attention.
- 4. The teacher checks and awards a point for each correct match.
- 5. The team with most points wins a prize, eg the first to go on a toilet break, a sweet each, etc.

Stage 2 - Creating phrasal verb role-plays

- 1. Teacher reforms the groups of 6 into 3 pairs.
- 2. Now, students in pairs think about a situation or a story and use the phrasal verbs in context, eg Last night I received a surprise visit from my friends. They stayed for dinner, so my mum rustled up something to eat.
- 3. Once they've thought about their situation/story and the phrasal verbs to use in context they rehearse the dialogue/story to be role-played.

Stage 3 - Performing mini role-plays

- 1. Pairs perform their mini role-plays in front of the class.
- 2. The class must listen carefully to identify the phrasal verbs. When students hear a phrasal verb, they interrupt the role-play and repeat/shout the phrasal verb, if it is correct the teacher awards 1 point.



- 3. Pairs continue their role-play until it is finished.
- 4. The mini role-plays continue until everyone has performed.

Follow-up:

- 1. Pairs write their mini role-play and blank out the phrasal verbs to pass on to another group to complete.
- 2. Once pairs complete a role-play they go back to the owners of the role-play for peer correction.

Variation:

For a more scaffolded lesson the mini role-plays could be prepared in advance for students to read and complete with the phrasal verbs before acting them out.

Fashion		
Try on	to put on a piece of clothing in order to see how it looks and whether it fits	
Go with	to seem good, natural, or attractive in combination with something else	
Catch on	to become popular or fashionable	
Pick out	to choose one thing from a group of things	
Choose between	to decide between one or more items of clothing	
Keep up with	to make sure you are following the current trends	
Stand out	to be much more impressive and stylish than others	
Dress up	to put on special clothes that make you look like someone else, especially for fun	
Wear out	to use something a lot so that it can no longer be used	
Appeal to	to particularly like or want something	

Health & Fitness	
Come down with	to become ill with a particular disease, usually one that is not serious
Get over	to start to feel happy or well again after you have been unwell
Burn off	to use up energy or get rid of fat from your body by doing physical activity
Work out	to do physical exercise as a way of keeping fit
Keep up	to continue to do something or move at the same speed as someone or something else
Be keen on	to have a strong passion for something
Put on	to increase your body weight and become fatter
Warm up	to prepare for sport or activity by doing exercises or practicing just before it starts
Cut down on	to start eating, drinking, or smoking less of something because it is bad for your health
Look after	to take care of someone or something and make certain that they have everything they need or that they are safe

Learning a Foreign Language		
Pick up	to learn a new skill with ease	
Make out	to manage to see or hear someone or something, but only with difficulty	
Look up	to try to find a particular piece of information by looking in a book or on a list, or by using a computer	
Brush up on	to practise and improve your skills or knowledge of something	
Put somebody off	to make somebody not want to do a particular thing	
Focus on	to concentrate on something and pay particular attention to it	
Be good at	to have a natural talent for something	
Get by	to have just enough knowledge to be able to do what you need to do	
Figure out	to be able to understand something or solve a problem	
Knuckle down to	to start to work hard in order to be successful	

Money	
Save up (for)	to regularly put money in a bank or invest it so that you can use it later
Splash out on	to spend a lot of money, especially on nice things for yourself
Put aside	to save an amount of money so that you can buy or pay for something in the future
Rip off	to cheat someone, especially by charging them too much money for something
Pay for	to give someone money in exchange for a particular product or service
Pay back	to give someone the same amount of money that you borrowed from them
Chip in	to give some money to help pay for something
Cut back	to reduce the amount of money that you spend
Get by	to have just enough of money to be able to do what you need to do
Pay off	to give someone all the money that you have borrowed from them to buy something

Travel	
Set off	to start a journey or start going somewhere
Pull over	to stop a vehicle by the side of the road
Pick somebody up	to go and meet someone you have arranged to take somewhere by car
Drop somebody off	to take somebody to a place without getting out of the car yourself
Put somebody up	to let someone stay in your house
See somebody off	to go somewhere such as a station or airport with someone to say goodbye
Break down	to interrupt a journey when the vehicle stops working
Look around	to look at the area around you
Drive off	to start moving a vehicle and leave
Pull out (of)	to move onto a road or part of a road where the traffic is moving faster



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Get away with	to manage to do something bad without being punished or criticized for it
Talk back to	to reply quickly and rudely to something someone says.
Complain about	to say that something is not to your satisfaction or that something bad has happened
Find out	to discover that someone has been dishonest or has tricked you
Abide by	to accept a rule, decision, or instruction and obey it



Make up for	to do something good so that it makes a bad thing seem less of a problem
Let somebody down	to make someone disappointed by not doing something that they are expecting you to do
Tell off	to criticize someone angrily for doing something wrong
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
