Welcome

Welcome to the qualification specifications for the Integrated Skills in English (ISE) exam. The ISE exam assesses all four language skills – speaking, listening, reading and writing. The skills are tested both individually and together. This integrated approach reflects how language skills are used in real-life settings.

Transferable skills for study and employment

Preparing for ISE helps develop authentic communicative abilities and transferable skills that are crucial for academic study and employment. These skills include synthesising information, participating in interactive discussions and presenting on topics of personal interest.

An ISE level for every candidate

ISE is intended for young people and adults, typically at school, college or university, who are learning and using English in their studies. It is also suitable for working adults seeking a respected English language qualification. ISE covers all six levels of the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR) from A1 to C2 – so it's possible to gain a certificate at every stage of the language-learning journey.

Proof of English proficiency

ISE provides universities and employers with evidence of the required level of English proficiency for educational and professional purposes, such as entry to a course of study, a job application or promotion, or as part of a learner's personal development. It also provides government agencies with proof of a candidate's English proficiency where a specified language level is required for a visa.

Introduction to Trinity's Integrated Skills in English exams

Objective of the qualifications

Trinity's Integrated Skills in English (ISE) exams have been designed to reflect the type of tasks and texts students encounter within the educational domain or during their professional life. ISE provides evidence of candidates' proficiency across four skills in English language: speaking, listening, reading and writing. Candidates may use an ISE qualification as evidence of their English language ability across all six CEFR levels, from A1 to C2.

Who the qualifications are for

The intended ISE candidate is a young person or adult, typically at secondary school or college, who is using English as a second or foreign language as part of their studies to develop their skills and improve their knowledge of a range of subject areas. The typical ISE candidate is aged between 12 and 19 but may be older. Candidates at CEFR level A1 may be as young as 10 years old and have been studying English in school for a year or so.

Students do not need to have taken any exams prior to taking ISE. Entry for a higher level of ISE does not require candidates to have passed lower levels, and candidates may enter for the exam when they feel they are ready for their target level.

Trinity is committed to making its exams accessible to all, and each candidate is treated individually when considering how assessments can be adapted for those with special needs. Find out more at trinitycollege.com/language-special-needs.

Recognition

Trinity College London is an international awarding organisation regulated by Ofqual (Office of Qualifications and Examinations Regulation) in England, CCEA Regulation in Northern Ireland and by Qualifications Wales. Trinity's Integrated Skills in English are regulated by these authorities within the Regulated Qualifications Framework (RQF) and are recognised by other education authorities in many countries around the world.

Trinity's approved Secure English Language Test (SELT) qualifications, when taken at Trinity SELT centres, are accepted by UK Visas and Immigration (UKVI) for certain UK visa categories. This does not currently include ISE Digital.

Learning outcomes and assessment criteria

ISE A1

(RQF Entry Level 1, CEFR A1)

Learning outcomes

The learner will:

1. Talk very briefly about familiar topics
2. Listen to short descriptions and conversations on concrete and familiar topics
3. Read short concrete texts (eg notices, posters and catalogues)
4. Write a short, simple text and/or complete a form (eg a passport application)

Assessment criteria

The learner can:

- 1.1 Use simple phrases to ask and answer questions
- 2.1 Understand familiar words and very basic phrases
- 2.2 Understand when people speak slowly and clearly
- 3.1 Understand familiar names, words and very simple phrases
- 4.1 Use simple phrases to convey their message

ISE Foundation

(RQF Entry Level 2, CEFR A2)

Learning outcomes

The learner will:

1. Exchange information on familiar topics
2. Listen to descriptions and conversations on familiar topics (eg shopping, local area, employment)
3. Read simple, everyday texts (eg advertisements, prospectuses, menus and timetables)
4. Write a short, simple message or letter on familiar topics

Assessment criteria

The learner can:

- 1.1 Use short phrases and sentences
- 1.2 Participate in short social exchanges
- 2.1 Understand familiar phrases and short texts
- 2.2 Understand when people speak clearly
- 3.1 Understand short, simple texts
- 3.2 Find specific, predictable information in texts
- 4.1 Use short phrases and sentences to convey their message

ISE I

(RQF Entry Level 3, CEFR B1)

Learning outcomes

The learner will:

1. Talk about/discuss topics that are familiar, of personal interest or pertinent to everyday life
2. Listen to descriptions and discussions on topics regularly encountered in work, school, leisure, etc
3. Read everyday and job-related texts (eg letters, articles and stories)
4. Write simple, connected text on familiar topics

Assessment criteria

The learner can:

- 1.1 Participate spontaneously in exchanges
- 1.2 Provide descriptions, opinions and plans
- 2.1 Understand radio or TV programmes on current affairs or topics of personal or professional interest
- 2.2 Understand speech that is relatively slow and clear
- 3.1 Understand commonly used language, especially on familiar topics, such as everyday life and work
- 3.2 Understand descriptions of events, feelings and wishes
- 4.1 Write sentences and paragraphs to convey their message
- 4.2 Describe experiences and impressions

ISE II

(RQF Level 1, CEFR B2)

Learning outcomes

The learner will:

1. Talk on a wide range of subjects
2. Listen to lectures on topics of interest, TV news and current affairs programmes
3. Read articles and reports concerned with contemporary problems
4. Write essays or reports on subjects related to their interests

Assessment criteria

The learner can:

- 1.1 Actively respond to exchanges
- 1.2 Explain a viewpoint on a topic or issue, giving the advantages and disadvantages of various options
- 2.1 Understand extended speech
- 2.2 Follow extended lines of argument if the topic is reasonably familiar
- 3.1 Understand lengthy texts written on a wide range of topics
- 3.2 Understand writers' attitudes or viewpoints
- 4.1 Write clear, detailed texts
- 4.2 Give reasons in support of, or against a particular point of view
- 4.3 Highlight the personal significance of events and experiences

ISE III

(RQF Level 2, CEFR C1)

Learning outcomes

The learner will:

1. Talk about/discuss complex subjects

2. Listen to lectures, TV news and current affairs programmes

3. Read specialised articles and longer technical instructions

4. Write essays or reports about complex subjects

Assessment criteria

The learner can:

1.1 Express themselves fluently and spontaneously

1.2 Offer clear, detailed descriptions

1.3 Formulate ideas and opinions with precision

2.1 Understand extended speech even when it is not clearly structured and/or when the topic is unfamiliar

2.2 Understand natural speech without too much effort

3.1 Understand texts even when the topic is unfamiliar

3.2 Appreciate distinctions of style

4.1 Write clear, well-structured text, expressing points of view at some length

4.2 Emphasise the salient issues

4.3 Select an appropriate style for the reader

Integrated Skills in English: Pathways

► ISE Digital

(available globally)

ISE Digital is delivered entirely by computer. There are four modules – Speaking, Listening, Reading and Writing. Candidates take the exam under strictly controlled supervision on verified secure computer equipment.

► ISE (paper edition)

(available in registered exam centres in selected locations)

There are two exam modules – Speaking & Listening and Reading & Writing. These can be taken together or separately. One-to-one, face-to-face Speaking & Listening assessments can be taken in person or via live video conference. The Reading & Writing module is taken as a written exam.

ISE (paper edition) is currently administered in these countries:

- **Asia:** China, India, Macau, Malaysia, Sri Lanka, United Arab Emirates
- **Europe:** Albania, Andorra, Bulgaria, France, Italy, Malta, Moldova, Portugal, Republic of Ireland, Romania, Spain, Turkey, United Kingdom
- **South America:** Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Mexico, Paraguay, Peru, Uruguay.

Qualification information

Assessment and marking

Each ISE module is assessed using either dichotomous (right/wrong) scoring or rating scales. The result for each module is calculated by converting the raw score into a standardised reporting score. Information about the reporting score for each delivery pathway can be found in the ISE (paper edition) and ISE Digital exam information booklets.

The ISE achievement levels align with the levels of the Common European Framework of Reference (CEFR) for languages (Council of Europe, 2001, 2020).

Duration of study (total qualification time)

All regulated qualifications are assigned a total qualification time. This should be used as guidance only. Total qualification time is an estimate of the average time a candidate spends with a teacher (guided learning hours) added to the average time spent learning independently. It is recognised that the amount of time needed to commit to a qualification will be dependent on each individual's level of experience.

Qualification certificate

When candidates have completed all ISE modules, they will receive an overarching certificate. This will show:

- ▶ the candidate's score for each module
- ▶ the overall score for the qualification
- ▶ the CEFR level they have achieved.

Where the qualifications could lead

While, for some learners, ISE qualifications represent personal goals and objectives, they are designed to support decisions that rely on a general, CEFR-aligned description of English language proficiency across speaking, listening, reading and writing. ISE qualifications may therefore be used to provide evidence of English proficiency for educational, professional and mobility-related purposes:

- to provide universities and other higher education institutions with evidence of the required level of English proficiency for entrance to a diploma, degree or vocational course
- to provide secondary schools and parents with evidence of learning and progress in English
- to provide course providers with evidence of the required level of English proficiency for a candidate to take a course that uses English-medium teaching or Content and Language Integrated Learning (CLIL) methodology
- to provide employers with evidence of the required level of English proficiency for professional purposes, such as a job application or promotion, or as part of a learner's professional development
- to provide government agencies with evidence of a candidate's English proficiency where a specified language level is required for a visa.

Appropriate use and limitations of interpretation

Misuse may arise where results are applied outside this scope, for example by using the qualification with candidates whose age or learning context is not aligned with the intended test population, by treating results as evidence of specialist professional competence or non-linguistic abilities or by extending interpretations beyond those set out in Trinity's published score reporting and guidance.
