

Skills for Life – Entry 2

Activity 1: Marriage (CEFR A2)

Level: Time: Resources:

Aims:

✓ To develop skills and knowledge in speaking and listening at Entry 2

- √ To explore vocabulary connected to Entry 2 topics
- ✓ To practise asking and answering questions in the past simple
- ✓ To develop ability to describe and ask questions about marriage
- ✓ To talk about a specific event

Exam task focus: Component 1 Task 1

Procedure

- 1. Display an image of a wedding invitation (on Handout). Ask students (SS) what the invitation is for (they may be able to guess) and then what they think a reception is. Since the reception follows i.e. is afterwards, they may be able to guess. Ask them what they think the lesson will be about and tell them they are going to be talking about marriage. Display the lesson aims.
- 2. Share handout via chatbox and draw SS attention to Activity 2. Ask SS to read the statements individually and circle 'yes' or 'no' for their country. Before they, read draw their attention to the glossary. Once they have circled the statements, explain that they need to compare what happens in different countries. Put SS into breakout rooms (BOR) groups of 3/4 preferably mixing nationalities. Before they talk together, focus on the language box and expressions to express views and feelings. Drill the examples and focus on the form. Open BORs. Whilst students are talking, visit BORs to monitor and help them with any difficulties they are having.
- 3. Close BORs and return to main room to conduct whole class feedback and tell them what happens in the UK as one of the aims of the activity is to raise awareness of what happens in their new country i.e. the fact that fewer and fewer people are getting married these days and living together with families is becoming more prevalent. At this point, teach the word 'partner' to describe the person you live with who is not a husband or wife.
- 4. Pre-teach 'registry office' and 'speeches'. Ask SS to work individually to match the questions and answers in Activity 3. Tell them to check in pairs in BORs. Open BORs. Close BORs and return to main room to conduct whole class feedback. Drill the questions.
 - a. Answers: 1 c, 2 f, 3 b, 4 e, 5 a, 6 d
- 5. Tell SS they are going to tell each other about a recent wedding they went to. They are going to work in pairs and ask each other questions. If possible, they should use the questions from Activity 3. If they have phones and have photos of a wedding on their phone, that would bring the activity alive. Alternatively, you could suggest using the image at the bottom of the page.



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Open a BOR for each pair. Visit BORS to monitor students whilst they are doing the activity and make a note of anything they are doing well or not so well.

- 6. Close BORs and return to main room to conduct whole class feedback on the content of their discussions. If there is time you could use the examples you collected whilst monitoring for a delayed correction phase.
- 7. Focus students' attention on the exam box at the bottom of the handout to explain how the lesson has helped to prepare them for Task 1 of the Trinity Entry Level 2 Skills for Life Speaking exam. Explain that for the actual exam they will need to provide a photograph of a past event and a wedding is one example. However, it is important to avoid bringing photos with too many people in them. If they want to talk about a wedding, they should ensure that they only have a small number of people in the photo.



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Glossary
